A Message from the Executive Director

As a result of challenging economic times when consumers are purchasing less, it is not uncommon to see waste generation decrease. Although residents in central Virginia are buying less and have less to throw away, they recycled just as much and more by weight in fiscal year 2009 then in past years. The volume of traditional recyclables (paper, cans, and bottles) collected through CVWMA's curbside and drop-off recycling programs has steadily increased over the last three to four years, up 2.4% in 2009 and 4.8% in 2008.

The CVWMA continues to offer a variety of regional cost effective recycling and solid waste programs to best fit

the individual needs of our member localities. Many programs such as metal, battery, oil and textile recycling are provided at no cost to participating jurisdictions and generate revenue that aids in the operation of other solid waste programs.

CVWMA Wins 2009 Richmond History Makers Award

The CVWMA continues to be recognized as an excellent example of regional cooperation. On October 20th, the CVWMA was the proud recipient of the Richmond History Makers Award for fostering regional cooperation by the Valentine Richmond History Center. CVWMA Partners with Ukrop's to Promote E-Cycling Events

The ever changing world of technology has created a challenge for the recycling and solid waste industries in recent years. Through the CVWMA electronics recycling program, 398 tons of ewaste was recycled in fiscal year 2009, more than double the 178 tons collected and recycled in 2008. Various parts of the popular electronic devices may contain dangerous heavy metals, including lead, silver, barium, cadmium, chromium and mercury; therefore increasing the importance of proper disposal and recycling.

Once again, CVWMA is partnering with Ukrop's Supermarkets to promote electronics recycling. One event was held in October and three more are scheduled to be held at area Ukrop's in November. Events will be held on November 7 at the Crossridge and White Oak Village Mall locations and on November 14 at the John Rolfe Parkway store.



Curbside Recycling Expands in Hanover County



Beginning July 1, 2008, Hanover County introduced curbside recycling in two of its larger neighborhoods (Ashcreek and Milestone subdivisions). As of July 1, 2009 nine more subdivisions (Atlee Ridge, Castlewood, Craney Island Farms, Deer Valley, Kings Charter, Madison Springs, Reardons Ridge, Royal Glen, And Somerset) now receive bi-weekly curbside recycling collection. 2009 Virginia Litter & Recycling Summit

The CVWMA worked with Altria, TFC Recycling, Keep America Beautiful, and Keep Virginia Beautiful to host



a one day summit at the Henrico Training Facility for 100 professionals across the Commonwealth on October 21st. The purpose of the summit was to bring together local governments, businesses, corporations, litter and recycling program managers, state agencies, universities, non-profits and others that have a vested interest in keeping Virginia beautiful.

L. Preston Bryant, Jr., VA Secretary of Natural Resources, was the keynote speaker. The Secretary addressed the importance of Natural Resource

Conservation in Virginia. Sue Smith, Director of Education for Keep America Beautiful presented KAB's Toolbox for Community Change and a panel of experts provided recent data on community identified litter problems and the impact of litter in the Commonwealth. Other session panelists offered programs that highlight best practices in litter laws and enforcement. Recycling resources and programs as a solution to litter were provided along with other tools you can use in community.

Market Study Final Results Published

CVWMA worked with Dr. Cliff Fox, Assistant Director, VCU's Department of Environmental Studies as well as Princeton Data Source, LLC (PDS) to conduct a study of residents eligible for curbside recycling in the region. The purpose of the study was to collect data to help CVWMA best target potential recyclers and to motivate more households to participate in the curbside collection program. The survey provided insight and confirmed speculated attitudes and behaviors associated with recycling in general and recycling at the curb.

The telephone survey portion of the study interviewed 1,001 people eligible for curbside recycling in the region. Data collected was weighted based on demographics, such as age, race and income. Respondents answered questions ranging from how often do you recycle, what items do you recycle to ways for CVWMA to improve the program and what would make those not presently recycling to start. Questions asked in the study denotes that overall, 74.9 percent of the respondents indicated participating in the program once during the last year and those that have participated, almost 80 percent indicated participating every collection day they are home. Of those that have not participated, 35 percent did not know it was available to them. Almost 80 percent of the respondents have heard of CVWMA, with the majority citing trucks, bins and collection calendar as the ways they have heard of us.

Based on the results of the overall study (including telephone survey and the three focus groups responses) the CVWMA will continue a region-wide approach, with an increased emphasis on targeted and community based messages. In addition, the study reiterated that the communities we serve are very diverse and tailoring messages and outreach efforts may result in increased awareness of the CVWMA and recycling in the area (eg. urban vs. suburban differences). It was concluded that CVWMA needs to continue a balanced approach, including broad based education to maintain the current level of recyclers, and by adding more community based outreach to more specific targeted areas. \heartsuit

2010 Recycling Schedule Has a New Look

In an effort to reduce costs of the vastly popular curbside collection schedule, an over-sized postcard will replace the traditional tri-fold schedule with a magnet in 2010. The collection schedule is mailed to 250,000 eligible households in 7 participating localities. Be on the look out for this newly designed pub-

DEQ and Virginia's Computer Recovery and Recycling Act (2008)

Legislation was passed in 2008 to require a computer manufacturer to implement a recovery/recycling plan for those computers they manufactured and sold, in excess of 500 units in Virginia in any calendar year at no charge to the consumer. The legislation went into effect on July 1, 2009.
